

NOTE FROM THE DRAMATURGE

How do our brains influence our memories, our free will, and our capacity for greatness? *Incognito* asks these questions by exploring the lives of some unique historical figures (and a few fictional ones).

In 1936, Henry Molaison began experiencing epileptic seizures. After several years, his seizures became incapacitating and he agreed to undergo an experimental psychosurgery to treat them. The surgeon removed parts of Henry's medial temporal lobe, including the hippocampus on both sides of his brain. This greatly reduced Henry's seizures but with an unfortunate side effect. For the rest of his life, Henry was unable to form new long term memories.

Unlike the Henry in *Incognito*, Henry Molaison never married. He lived with his parents and later in a care facility. Henry spent his life working with scientists, like Dr. Suzanne Corkin of MIT, as they attempted to understand what went wrong with his surgery. In the process, Henry helped scientists create a modern model of memory.

Our senses send information to our brain where it's encoded and perceived. We hold a small amount of this encoded information in our working memory before it either degrades and is forgotten or it's stored in a web of connections called long term memory. By activating those connections, we retrieve information and reconstruct events and facts from the past – we remember.

Henry's working memory and his ability to retrieve memories from before his surgery were largely intact but Henry wasn't able to store new memories without his hippocampus. Henry demonstrated that some memories, such as motor skills (like playing the piano), rely on separate systems than conscious memories. By exhaustingly testing Henry's abilities, scientists gained a better understanding of how our memory works and how entwined our physical brains are with our introspective minds.

On April 17th, 1955, Albert Einstein died from an aneurysm. Dr. Thomas Harvey, a pathologist working at Princeton University, was asked to perform the autopsy. Upon learning that no scientific studies of Einstein's brain were planned, Harvey decided to take it upon himself. He removed Einstein's brain and took it home. Harvey would spend the rest of his life battling with a scientific establishment and a public who at different times saw him as a thief, a fool, and a man out of his depth. But Harvey always believed there must be physical proof of genius that could be discovered within Einstein's brain. The results remain inconclusive.

On May 23rd, 1987, Kenneth Walker got out of bed, drove 14 miles, and assaulted his in-laws, all without waking up. Kenneth had no memory of the event and no apparent motive. After undergoing psychological testing, doctors discovered that Kenneth's brain got stuck transitioning between wakefulness and deep sleep, enabling this remarkable level of sleepwalking. A jury ruled his actions were involuntary and declared him not guilty. His case demonstrates that complex behaviors can occur in the absence of free will and even conscious awareness.


